WHAT WE DO

The United Way of the Southern Alleghenies is strategically focused on funding evidence-based programs and impactful services aimed at three core initiatives:

- Early Childhood Development
- Parental Engagement
- Youth Drug & Alcohol Prevention

Our process finds, and provides funding for, an optimal group of programs that address our core initiatives, as well as other basic human needs. A growing roster of direct programming is helping to fill service voids where other options are not available.

We work with multiple organizations throughout our service area to help implement periodic health needs assessments. Those results, and other data, helps to guide our work.

United Way represents a unique place where like-minded community members can convene to create lasting change.

HOW WE GREW, AND WHY WE WILL HELP MORE PEOPLE THAN EVER BEFORE

United Way of the Laurel Highlands and United Way of Blair County have joined together as part of a strategic effort to leverage resources for maximum community impact in Blair, Cambria, and Somerset Counties.

WHY IT'S IMPORTANT: Both United Ways already invest heavily in early childhood development, parental engagement, and essential health and human services. This news will allow the combined agency to focus on strategic growth, leveraging staffing synergies and grant-making, to expand programming in each county. The goal is to help more people through carefully identified, evidence-based programs.

WHAT TO EXPECT: Both agencies already help more than 80,000 people a year. This union will result in more lives being impacted. As we grow together, United Way's Community Impact Model will be expanded into Blair County, leveraging volunteer panels to help us identify priority needs, and to find the right programs to fund, or create, to meet them. The goal is to increase the community impact in each of Blair, Cambria, and Somerset Counties.

HOW WE WORK

The United Way of the Southern Alleghenies uses an Enhanced Community Impact Model (ECIM)®

Enhanced Community Impact Model

The Enhanced Community Impact Model (ECIM) is the foundation of "how" the United Way implements, sustains, and creates lasting social change across a three-county service area. This model follows collective-impact strategies focused on building collaborative efforts to address priority community needs. Throughout the process, progress is tracked, measured, evaluated, and reported.

Community Impact Process



Funding Partner Agency Programs & Services

The impact of the United Way of the Southern Alleghenies would not be possible without the hard work and dedication of our 39 Partner Agencies that deliver programs and services to the community. Decisions on appropriate levels of funding allocated to these Partner Agencies is completed through the Community Impact Process. This process is completely driven by volunteers, and ultimately helps to determine what programs will be funded based upon the applications they evaluated.

To receive funding from the UWSA, a Partner Agency must go through the Request for Proposal Process. Many partner agencies have long-term relationships with UWSA, and continue to illustrate their impact to the community based upon an annual assessment, which is done via the Community Impact Process.

Non-UWSA Partner Agencies must respond to a Request for Information (RFI) put forth by the UWSA in order to submit an Request for Proposal (RFP). RFI's are not published annually, and are done so if the need to expand an area of impact is presented.

The Community Impact Committee, which is comprised of civic-minded leaders, United Way board members, and United Way volunteers, oversees the Community Impact Panels.

PANEL #1 - Helping Children & Youth Succeed


The HCYS panel is focused on evaluating Partner Agency programming in Cambria/Somerset for our youngest community members. Volunteers who comprise this panel will evaluate programs focused on pre-birth to school-aged youth.

PANEL #2 - Strengthening & Supporting Families, Supporting the Vulnerable & Aging, Promoting Self-Sufficiency, and Promoting Health & Wellness

This panel is focused on evaluating Partner Agency programs in Cambria/Somerset, which strengthen families, promote health and wellness, support the vulnerable and aging, or promote self-sufficiency. Volunteers on this panel also review programs focused on basic human needs within our community.


PANEL #3 - Blair County Programs

Building a Civic Infrastructure for Early Childhood



Designing & Implementing a Resource Model - Parental Pathways to Success

The United Way of the Southern Alleghenies, in partnership with multiple early learning providers, school districts, and agencies, has built the *Parental Pathway to Success*. This linear model guides parents and their children through specific programs and services available within the community that assist, strengthen, and support healthy family development, promote resiliency, and create sustainable self-sufficiency.

The model accomplishes three main goals:

- 1. Maintain continued year-to-year support and assistance for at-risk families needing aid via family and personal development.
- 2. Provide a continuum of care for both parents and their children, leading up to the child entering our school systems.
- 3. Increase parental knowledge of child development and care, while preparing all children socially, emotionally, and academically for kindergarten.

United Way of the Southern Alleghenies has been dedicated to developing strategies, opportunities, collaborations that strengthen our youngest learners. Using a whole-child approach, we seek to make investments that support children's health, learning, nutrition. economic security, and safety. We know that bright futures happen when we empower children and families.



Implementation, Funding, and Outcomes

Following the Enhanced Community Impact Model®, the United Way of the Southern Alleghenies funds both the *Nurse-Family Partnership* and *Parents as Teachers* programs at sustainable levels in Blair, Cambria, and Somerset Counties through annual fundraising, grant procurement, state and federal funding, and continued foundation support. The implementation and scaling of these programs has led to the following results in Blair, Cambria, and Somerset Counties.

Meet the Early Childhood Systems Coordinator

The United Way of the Southern Alleghenies, in partnership with the 1889 Foundation, Community Foundation for the Alleghenies, Lee Initiatives, the Center for Population Health, and Vision Together 2025, is excited to introduce Lauren Lazzari as the Early Childhood Systems Coordinator for Cambria and Somerset counties.

The hire comes after an extensive planning process leveraging the insight of experts from numerous organizations serving the early childhood sector in the region.

In the role, Lazzari will oversee the organization and implementation of the early childhood strategic plan for Cambria and Somerset counties.

"I strongly believe our region is the best place to raise a family and my work entails making sure that child health, nutrition, education, safety, and economic stability are all being addressed to make this possible," Lazzari said.

Lazzari previously worked for Beginnings Inc., a long-time United Way Partner Agency implementing the crucial Parents As Teachers program.

PRESCHOOL & AFTERSCHOOL PROGRAMMING

At the United Way, we continue fund high quality preschool and afterschool programming within our community. Investment in these programs helps children to develop socially and emotionally, and contributes to academic success. Through our Partner Agencies, children continue to receive the care they need to learn, grow, and thrive.

Preschool Programming - Partner Agencies & Impact

- The Learning Lamp Early Childhood Behavioral Intervention & Support Program was funded at \$25,000 in 2023-24. This program incorporates the expertise of three Master's level Early Childhood Mental Health Consultants who provide both individual child and classroom observations, develop recommendations for improvements, and coach staff and parents through implementation.
- <u>Small Town Hope</u> Funded in the amount of \$26,000 in 2023-24 to provide preschool programming to children in the northern areas of Cambria County, Small Town Hope continues to provide high-quality learning experiences to 20 students.

Afterschool Programming - Partner Agencies & Impact

- Flood City Youth Academy Funded in the amount of \$20,000 in 2023-24 to provide an afterschool tutoring and mentoring program to, on average, 175 students each weekday. Each student also receives a meal.
- Boys & Girls Club of Somerset County (BGC) Funded in the amount of \$7,000 in 2023-24 the Boys & Girls Club of Somerset County's "Power Hour" program has become a community asset for advancing student learning in grades K-5. Funding from the UWSA gives BGC the ability to secure volunteers to assist students with one-on-one tutoring.
- Gloria Gates Foundation Funded in the amount of \$11,438 in 2023-24 to provide afterschool programs to youth in Blair County.
- **<u>Big Brothers Big Sisters</u>** Funded in the amount of \$5,313 in 2023-24 for two programs, which provides youth mentoring in Blair County.
- <u>Leadership Blair County Youth</u> This program received \$625 in funding in 2023-24 to implement a leadership program to youth in Blair County.

Diaper Bank, Toasty Toddler & Stuff the Bus

Diaper Bank

On average, about 1 in 2 families fall short by about 25 diapers each month, creating a barrier for parents to get their children into day care and preschool. This, in turn, creates a barrier to going to work. Our growing diaper bank network was developed to meet that emerging need. The network of distribution points throughout Cambria/Somerset Counties provides more than 8,000 diapers a month to families. In 2024-25, UWSA staff will explore expanding the Diaper Bank to Blair County.

Toasty Toddler (Blair County)

719 children ages birth to 5 received new winter wear.

Stuff the Bus (Blair County)

551 students in grades K-12 received new school supplies and backpacks.

FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER OF BLAIR COUNTY/HEALTHY BLAIR COUNTY COALITION



Sponsoring the Family Resource Center of Blair County is one of the ways that United Way is making a positive impact on early childhood education.

The Family Resource Center is one of 42 state-funded Family Centers in Pennsylvania. Family Centers increase parent involvement and knowledge, a child's success in school, school readiness, and the health and welfare of families. Family Centers help to prevent child abuse and neglect and saves the Commonwealth money in terms of reduced crime, increased labor market benefits, and health care savings.

The Family Resource Center offers many cost-free programs including:

- Parents As Teachers, an evidence-based home visiting program for families with children prenatal to Kindergarten entry. The
 center is a Blue Ribbon Affiliate of the international Parents As Teachers, making it one of the top performing early education
 and home visiting affiliates within the network.
- Make Parenting A Pleasure, evidence-informed parenting classes for any parent in Blair County wishing to learn more about parenting.
- Families in Recovery, pilot parenting class program that works with families experiencing addiction and recovery.
- Community Outreach Programs, including Stuff the Bus, Toasty Toddler, and Week of the Young Child Celebration.

Volunteer Opportunities

The Family Resource Center has a variety of volunteer opportunities that allow community members to share their time and talents for the benefit of families in our community:

- Parents as Teachers assist with the planning and implementation of group activities
- Parent Education Classes help to provide expertise and classes that interest parents
- Stuff the Bus donation, collection, and distribution of school supplies
- Toasty Toddler donation, collection, and distribution of winter supplies
- Week of the Young Child Celebration join the planning committee or set up an activity at the celebration For more information about the center, contact Denise Adams, Family Resource Director, at 814-317-5567, Ext. 405.

To assess facets of a healthy Blair County by sharing resources, engaging local partnerships, and implementing strategies and programs to make a positive impact on the lives of the people in our community.




YOUTH DRUG & ALCOHOL PREVENTION INITIATIVE

The United Way of the Southern Alleghenies is committed to providing youth drug and alcohol prevention programming in all school districts in both Cambria and Somerset Counties. In 2011, the UWSA Board of Directors made the decision to fund the growth and expansion of the nation's top prevention program, Botvin LifeSkills Training, in four predetermined school districts across both Cambria and Somerset, reaching approximately 160 students.

During the last 12 years, the work of the UWSA, along with many key community stakeholders, including each county's Single County Authority, Twin Lakes Center, Cambria County Drug Coalition, Somerset Drug-Free Communities, the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency, University of Colorado, 30 school districts, and providers of Youth Drug & Alcohol Prevention programming, have made significant a impact within the region. Botvin is now being taught to 6,603 students each year.

PA 211 Helpline

PA 211 is non-emergency helpline dedicated to connecting individuals who are in need of health and human services with local information and resources that can help them during their time of need. PA 211 is available to all residents in Blair, Cambria, and Somerset Counties free of charge, and is available 24/7, 365 days a year. Annually, PA 211 receives more than 1,700 total contacts from Blair, Cambria, and Somerset residents seeking help for health and human services related to:

- Utility Assistance
- Rent Assistance
- Medical Assistance
- Drug & Alcohol Support or Treatment
- Mortgage Assistance
- Employment Assistance
- Transportation Assistance
- Food Assistance



GLASS SLIPPER PROJECT



The Glass Slipper Project was open this year to teens from Blair, Cambria, and Somerset Counties. The program provided 187 teens with dresses and accessories worth \$56,100. This year, UWSA partnered with Night to Shine to provide 24 adults with intellectual disabilities with formal wear for their annual event, which is a prom-like experience.

BASIC HUMAN NEEDS INITIATIVE

Supporting Basic Human Needs

Our United Way invests in basic human needs by funding the work and programs of our dedicated Partner Agencies. These programs commonly provide the vital resources and assistance that most individuals use to avoid crisis situations.

Through the work, these Partner Agencies enable the United Way to reach and impact the lives of more than 82,000 individuals each year. Programs within this initiative area span across the following seven platforms:





The United Way of the Southern Alleghenies is the lead administrator of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture Grant for Cambria County. During the course of the 2022-2023 grant funding cycle, \$221,903 was allocated to 20 local food pantries and meal centers via the PA Department of Agriculture grant, serving approximately 39,948 individuals requiring food assistance.



Addressing the issue of homelessness in Cambria and Somerset Counties has quickly become a priority area for our United Way. To address this growing need, we invest funding in two separate shelters within our region — \$15,000 to the Martha and Mary House, operated by Catholic Charities in Cambria, and \$10,000 to the Next Step Center in Somerset. Combined, these agencies serve more than 165 individuals annually.



Supporting Mental Health programs is important to sustaining the health and well-being of our community. In doing so, our United Way invested \$15,000 in funding to the Peer Empowerment Network, which annually sees more than 1,400 individuals within Cambria County.



We support the needs of many individuals through funding Emergency Utility Assistance programs in both Cambria and Somerset Counties. In Cambria, Catholic Charities receives \$14,000 annually to provide emergency financial assistance to individuals seeking vital support. In Somerset, \$3,500 is allocated to The Salvation Army — Somerset to provide heating assistance to families.



The work of Highlands Health is an important asset for providing much-needed healthcare in Cambria and Somerset Counties. In 2023-24, Highlands Health received \$32,500 to provide Medical Assistance medical assistance to 914 individuals in our two-county region. Highlands Health administered 234 COVID-19 vaccines.



Addressing direct victims of crime and domestic abuse within our community is a focus at United Way. We are very grateful to have two Partner Agencies that continue to make a positive impact each year. Victim Services, Inc. received \$50,000 and Family Services, Inc., serving Blair County, received \$9,063. Both programs provide direct support to individuals escaping domestic violence or abuse.

SNAP AT THE MARKET


The United Way of the Southern Alleghenies, in coordination with other partners, made SNAP benefits usable at the Downtown Johnstown Farmer's Market for the first full season. The program was first piloted from August-October of 2022.

United Way worked with the United States Department of Agriculture to acquire the necessary technology and to become the qualified agency responsible for processing SNAP benefits. Community volunteers are trained to help work the market each Friday during the season.

GRANT WRITING

Beginning in 2016, the United Way's Grant Writing Initiative was developed to support grant procurement for both United Way initiatives and community-based collaborations. During the last eight years, the initiative has helped to secure more than \$14.1 million in grant funding, which has largely benefited vital community-based efforts in both Cambria and Somerset Counties. The following table illustrates the progress that has been made throughout the course of the 2022-2023 grant writing cycle. 
Top ratings for efficiency and transparency





More than \$58,000 raised at Power of the Purse (a record)

Women United of the Southern Alleghenies hosted the annual fundraiser at 1st Summit Arena for the second consecutive year in 2023. United Way's top fundraising event has grown significantly, raising more than \$170,000 in support of the United Way's top two core initiative areas, Parents as Teachers and Nurse-Family Partnership, since 2017.

There were more than 700 women in attendance the last two years, raising a record amount of money, and more than 20,000 diapers for the UWSA's growing diaper bank. This year, funding will also support Toasty Toddler in Blair County, run by United Way's Family Resource Center.


